VCU was again ranked among the top health care management programs in the nation this spring in *U.S. News & World Report*. We were named a No. 3 program in America for 2023, moving up from the No. 5 spot in rankings from 2019.

Our alums are our outcomes, and their successes speak for themselves. White speaks on 'co-creation of learning' in Mick Lecture

Kenneth R. White, Ph.D., AGACNP, ACHPN, FACHE, FAAN, dean and professor of the MGH Institute of Health Professions School of Nursing in Boston, delivered the Stephen S. Mick Lecture earlier this spring. White spoke on "Co-Creation of Learning: Curiosity, Authenticity, and Serendipity."

A former VCU administrator, White directed the MHA program and served as the inaugural Charles P. Cardwell, Jr. Professor of Health Administration from 2001 to 2008, and he served as associate director of the MHA and MSHA programs from 1995 to 2001.

White also served as the inaugural Sentara Professor in Health Administration at VCU. He has held other leadership roles with the University of Virginia and Mercy Health Services.

The lecture honors Mick, faculty emeritus, who served as the Arthur Graham Glasgow Endowed Chair of the Department of Health Administration for a decade, ending in 2009. The program supports the department in bringing in guest speakers to address current and relevant topics in the industry.

Health Administration Ranked Third in Nation

The Department of Health Administration has been ranked among the top healthcare management programs in the nation, according to rankings *U.S. News & World Report* released in April. VCU is ranked as a No. 3 program in America for 2023, moving up from the No. 5 spot in the previous rankings from 2019.

"It is a true honor to be viewed so favorably among our peers. We've built our reputation on developing graduates who can readily step into health system leadership roles and positively impact their organizations and communities," said Paula H. Song, Ph.D., the Richard M. Bracken Chair and Professor of Health Administration. "This ranking is a testament that our program is delivering the high caliber of leaders that healthcare systems need to successfully navigate the ever-growing challenges they face today. We continue to refine our curriculum so that our students are prepared to immediately step in and make a difference."

VCU has consistently been ranked among top healthcare management programs since the 1990s. U.S. News rankings reflect how peers view VCU Health Administration and its two jointly accredited graduate degree tracks: the MHA and the MSHA.

VCU secured the No. 3 spot in a tie with Rush University College of Health Sciences, the University of Michigan School of Public Health, and the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill Gillings School of Global Public Health.

"It is a crowded field at the top, which shows the strength of the health-care management education field and is a great sign for the profession at large. Collectively, our peers at health administration programs have really taken note of the strength and diversity of our faculty leadership, their research, and teaching experience. With each new faculty hire, we deepen our program and broaden our profile," Song said. "That bears out with equally diverse and talented students, the strength of our unique third-year residency program, and the excellent job placement of our graduates."

Cardwell Comments is named for Charles P. Cardwell, Jr., who established the original curriculum for the VCU Department of Health Administration. Cardwell became director of the Medical College of Virginia's hospital division in 1947 (what is now known as VCU Health). He was awarded MCV's first honorary doctorate (in hospital administration) in 1962. For 22 years, he served as director of the teaching hospitals until his 1969 retirement. After his retirement, Cardwell was active in the MCV alumni society, served on several administrative councils, and still found time to teach once a week.

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

After Johnston passed away in June 2022 following an illness, students searched for a way to continue honoring her legacy.

"It was important for us to have a way to remember her beyond a traditional class gift and create something that continues to grow with each class," said Rebecca Jacobs, the MHA '23 class vice president.

Students found that lasting tribute in the form of a golf tournament in Johnston's memory that was held on April 21. Taiwan health administration students experience U.S. healthcare

How does the U.S. healthcare system compare to Taiwan's?

Health administration students from Taiwan's Kaohsiung Medical University traveled to Virginia in March to find answers and experience the strengths and challenges of healthcare in America.

For more than two decades, VCU Health Administration has hosted students from KMU under a partnership that originated under the department's former chair Thomas Wan, Ph.D., MA. This year's visit was the first since before the pandemic.

The tour was led by Paige Powell, Ph.D, MHA, VCU's MHA/MSHA program director and associate professor. Taking place over VCU's spring break, the KMU students spent nearly a week in Richmond, Williamsburg, and Charlottesville where they toured medical facilities and met with healthcare leaders across specialties.

"It's a highly valuable cultural exchange where we each learn from one another," Powell said. "For our own faculty and for me personally, I learned a lot about the Taiwanese system that I didn't know before, and it helped me learn more about our systems here in Virginia."

Taiwan has a single-payer system with one government agency controlling healthcare for all. Enrollment is mandatory though citizens can use private insurers for certain procedures and maintain autonomy within the system to choose their own doctors and facilities. Still, Taiwanese healthcare is not without its own challenges.

"It's a highly valuable cultural exchange where we each learn from one another."

"But America spends about three times what the Taiwanese do on healthcare each year," Powell said.

The KMU students and faculty had a lot of interest and questions surrounding cost-effectiveness and quality of care, the latter widely viewed as a weakness in the Taiwanese healthcare system.

"And they were impressed with the technology we have and the amount of technology we have, but they also recognize that it is a high cost driver in our healthcare system," Powell said

A professor emeritus of both VCU and the University of Central Florida's School of Global Health Management and Informatics, Wan came to Richmond for the KMU visit and held a student workshop. Wan is also a visiting distinguished professor of KMU's Department of Healthcare Administration and Medical Informatics, and a gift to VCU from the university helps support doctoral students.

"This year's workshop holds particular significance for us as it marks KMU's return to VCU after the pandemic, making it a truly unique and memorable experience for our students to learn, visit healthcare systems, and witness various aspects in person," wrote I-Te (Yiter) Chen, chair of KMU's Department of Healthcare Administration and Medical Informatics, in an email to VCU faculty following the visit. "We extend our heartfelt appreciation and thank you for making this workshop a success and look forward to a continued collaboration between KMU and VCU."

MHA students vie in case study competitions

VCU first-year MHA students Lauren Mulholland, Nate Puffer, and Sydney Belt reached the finals at The Ohio State University's 12th Annual First-Year Health Administration Case Competition held April 13-14 in Columbus.

The VCU team was among 21 health administration teams competing. Designed to give students the opportunity to examine a real-life issue within a healthcare system, this year's case focused on inpatient and outpatient surgery capacity at Yale New Haven Hospital. The VCU team advanced to the final round with five other programs, and Mulholland won a "Best Presenter" award.

In other case study competitions this spring, rising third-year students Jared Dawson and Tanner Couch joined Mullholland at Baylor University, where Dawson won a "Best Presenter" award. Rising second-year students Brian Britt, Jordan Cosey, and Maya Perkins took part in a National Association of Health Services Executives competition, and first-year students Victor Melo, Alexandria Ritchie, and Emma Creech represented VCU at the University of Alabama at Birmingham Health Administration Case Competition.

Visionary entrepreneur, veteran leader share experience

Under Health Administration's new Executive-in-Residence program, students and faculty gain a direct link to healthcare leaders who can complement their MHA and MSHA education. The program establishes a partnership with a healthcare leader who has an interest in assisting students in preparation for transition from an academic setting to a practice environment. The leaders mentor students virtually and are on-site at VCU at least once a year.

"What the executive does from there is really in their court and based on their unique area of expertise," said Paula Song, Ph.D., the Richard M. Bracken Chair and Professor of Health

Howard Kern said the opportunity to serve as an Executive-in-Residence at VCU came at the perfect time.

Kern retired as President and CEO of Sentara Healthcare on Sept. 1 but will consult with the Hampton Roads health system until his official retirement at the end of 2023.

"After 43 years as a practicing healthcare leader, I decided to transition from a full-time chief executive, but I feel that I still have much to contribute to improving healthcare and want to give back to current and aspiring healthcare leaders," Kern said.

As the past CEO of the Norfolk-based, nationally ranked health system with \$12 billion in revenue and 32,000 employees, "guiding students on health leadership is a natural extension of my work with fellows and young executives in the field and a logical next step for serving in an EIR role," he said. "I believe I can give something to students that is really complementary to what the school already provides, which is a framework for how to apply what they're learning in a practice setting."



A QUALITY EXPERT AND VISIONARY:

Sheronica (Barcliff) Burgess, MSHA '13, Entrepreneur

Since graduating from Health Administration a decade ago, the time since has been "phenomenal, marked with great transition and seasons of harvest and sowing seeds," Sheronica Burgess said.

She founded The Barcliff Group (named after her maiden name), an Atlanta-based consultancy focused on helping clients nationwide improve health outcomes and "understand the connective tissue between corporate culture and making an impact in the community."

She left a corporate job in Washington, D.C., to become an entrepreneur, and she looked to her wheelhouse: healthcare quality, not necessarily management. She founded her own firm to focus on National Committee for Quality Assurance accreditation and regulatory compliance, plus management consulting, strategic planning, communications, and health tech. The Barcliff Group has served clients such as Kaiser Permanente and Imperial Health.

"I will be more vocal about my journey to entrepreneurship so that the path can be accessible to others," Burgess says. She notes some level of traditional experience is needed for an entrepreneur, but there is a growing chorus of healthcare leaders who dream of innovating the field and carving their own path. She wants to help steer VCU's curriculum to more topics that explore entrepreneurship in collaboration with faculty.
